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What is media literacy?

It's difficult to keep up with the fast pace of technological change. In fact, many educators (and many parents) feel like their kids know more about technology than they do. We can call these young people tech-savvy because they know so much about technology. Teachers have something that most young people haven't fully developed yet - a mature and informed understanding of the world.

What is media literacy?

Media literacy is the ability to understand, critique and create media messages.

Media messages are communicated via traditional media like print newspapers and television shows, and digital (or new media) like podcasts, video platforms and video games.



Disinformation and its types

Misinformation - unintentional mistakes, inaccurate date, statistics which is not serious

Disinformation - fabricated, manipulated, false content Malinformation - intentional change of contest, date or time of original content (leak, harassment, hate speech) with the purpose of harm.
