INSTITUTIONAL INNOVATION AND THE SDGS: A ROADMAP FOR TRANSFORMING THE ENGLISH LANGUAGE TEACHING SECTOR

Speaker: Mark C Mifsud

This presentation examines the integration of Education for Sustainable Development (ESD) within the Maltese English Language Teaching (ELT) sector. While global frameworks mandate a “Whole-Institution Approach,” niche educational sectors often lag in strategic implementation. Utilizing a mixed-methods “probing study” of 21 institutions, the research reveals a significant “Awareness-Action Gap”: high ideological commitment (61.9%) contrasted with low formal policy implementation (14.3%). The session explores how “ad-hoc” governance and “crowded curricula” hinder progress. Ultimately, it proposes a behavioural-policy framework to transform ELT schools into “Living Labs,” leveraging Malta’s educational tourism to foster global pro-environmental behaviour through transformative pedagogy.



Mark Mifsud is a Full Professor and prolific researcher with academic and consultancy appointments across Europe, Africa, and the US. His extensive career is defined by bridging the gap between theory and practice, advising government and industry on environmental policy while embedding innovative sustainability frameworks across all levels of education, from primary schools to doctoral programs.

Through practical insights and reflective leadership lessons, this session offers actionable strategies for school owners seeking resilience and meaningful impact.

She is an active member of ELTA Serbia and serves as European Manager for SOL, supporting collaboration with ELT associations across Central and South-East Europe and strengthening long-standing international professional networks.

WE NEED TO TALK ABOUT TEACHER EDUCATION

Be it because of schools' busy routines, lack of time, or interest in professional development, teacher education can often be neglected. Freeman (1989) has previously stated how language teacher education has been fragmented, and this can be easily identified when we look at the multitude of aspects to be considered and the new contexts for English language teaching today. In this talk, we are going to discuss core aspects to be considered when designing and implementing teacher development initiatives, as well as how to measure progress and instill an environment that welcomes and fosters Continuing Professional Development.

EAQUALS ASSOCIATION SPOTLIGHT: A QUALITY FRAMEWORK FOR MANAGER CPD

Speaker: Lou McLaughlin

The Eaquals Academic Management Competences Framework addresses the need for support for academic managers in terms of designing a clear path for their own development within an organisation or as they develop in their career and move from one organisation to the next. The framework provides a practical way of addressing this need both for managers and for their team. The framework is not a definitive statement on the competences requirement by the academic manager role, but is intended as a tool to support managers in the awareness raising of their own strengths and possible development paths. With this in mind, the practical implications of the framework will be clearly outlined with examples provided for discussion and reflection.

FROM IQ TO EQ: RETHINKING LEADERSHIP IN ELT

This session presents a leadership model for English language teaching based on Emmett C. Murphy's Leadership IQ (1996), as adapted in Christison and Murray (2009). The model highlights key leadership principles and work leader roles for guiding teams, shaping vision, and aligning practice with institutional goals. It also explores the role of emotional intelligence, focusing on personal and social competence, as well as the development of emotional competence. Participants will engage with practical strategies for applying these concepts in their own contexts. The session aims to support teacher growth through empathetic leadership and enhance institutional effectiveness by fostering a positive, collaborative, and resilient professional culture.



Panos Argyris is an ELT academic team leader with 14 years of international experience across the UK, Ireland, Spain, Russia, and Greece. He is the YLEUK Committee Academic Representative, a Cambridge Examiner for the British Council, a conference speaker, a teacher trainer and specialises in syllabi design.

ALONE TOGETHER: RETHINKING RESILIENCE IN ELT MANAGEMENT

In a post-pandemic landscape, ELT leaders are expected to be both pedagogical guides and business decision-makers, often in isolation. After one year as a Director of Studies, a number of recurring challenges and questions have come into sharper focus. While schools compete to survive, they also face shared challenges. Drawing on a background beyond ELT, this session reflects on how similar pressures are approached differently across industries, particularly in relation to collaboration and support. This session explores how resilience in ELT often remains reactive rather than proactive, and invites participants to reflect on how more networked, collaborative approaches to leadership might strengthen the sector.



Stefanelle Cachia is the Director of Studies at GV Malta and has worked in the ELT sector since 2017. Her background in language education, the arts, and cultural policy has shaped an interdisciplinary approach to academic leadership. She is particularly interested in how insights from other sectors can inform collaboration, resilience, and leadership in ELT.

10 PRINCIPLES OF EFFECTIVE TEACHING FOR TEACHER WELL BEING

Speaker: Thomas S.C. Farrell

Teaching can be a very rewarding experience for most teachers, but it also can be tiring after following the same routines for a number of years and as such we can 'plateau' at various times during our career thus affecting our overall well-being. Such plateauing is marked by feelings of sameness, frustration, disillusionment, and career stagnation. It can happen when we least expect it, after 2 years, 5 years, 10 years and even beyond that resulting in many teachers losing the joy, excitement, and wonder of teaching that makes us so effective in providing opportunities for our students to learn. This plenary will show how language teachers can overcome plateauing by considering ten principles of effective teaching and thus improving their overall well-being.



Thomas S.C. Farrell is Professor of Applied Linguistics at Brock University, Canada. Professor Farrell's professional interests include Reflective Practice and Language Teacher Education. WORKSHOP 1: THE BENEFITS OF SETTING ACHIEVABLE PROFESSIONAL GOALS

Goal-setting is a major part of our professional lives and, due to the effect on the brain, the achievement of these goals contributes to our general well-being. Research shows that the realisation of a goal leads to positive feelings and motivation, whereas the opposite occurs if we cannot achieve what we have planned. This practical workshop will introduce participants to the NLP goal-setting framework for setting realistic goals and the steps needed to achieve them as well as providing the space for them to try it out for themselves.

This interactive workshop explores practical strategies for motivating Generation Z and Generation Alpha learners in today's classrooms. Grounded in Self-Determination Theory, it focuses on autonomy, competence, and relatedness as key drivers of engagement. Participants will experience and adapt techniques such as gamification, retrieval practice, and purpose-driven tasks, transforming traditional activities into meaningful, student-centred learning experiences. Through collaborative tasks and real classroom scenarios, teachers will leave with practical, low-preparation strategies they can implement immediately to boost motivation, participation, and learning outcomes across a range of teaching contexts.

WORKSHOP 3: SPEAK LIKE A PRO, VOICE MISTAKES TO AVOID

Your voice can transform the way your message is heard. This workshop incorporates insights from years of presenting on stage and working with teachers, revealing common voice mistakes that weaken communication such as speaking in a flat tone, rushing through ideas, or skipping pauses. Through practical examples, the workshop demonstrates how small changes in pitch, rhythm, and timing can make speech clearer, more engaging, and easier to follow. Teachers will discover simple strategies to strengthen their own speaking skills and learn how to help their students become more confident and effective communicators.

Passionate about helping teachers grow, she leads training in Ukraine and abroad and works as an International Speaking Examiner. WORKSHOP 4: SEEN, HEARD, SUPPORTED, RETHINKING OBSERVATIONS TO EMPOWER TEACHERS

Observation practices should foster mutual cooperation and support rather than judgement, yet they are often experienced as stressful, top-down processes that can negatively impact teacher wellbeing and limit professional growth. This interactive workshop explores how a more collaborative, teacher-led approach can reshape this experience. Drawing on practical examples, participants will engage in reflective tasks based on real observation practices, including peer observation and co-teaching. They will explore how giving teachers greater agency can make observations more purposeful and supportive, and leave with simple strategies to adapt these practices within their own contexts.



Aureore Trouvé is a teacher and teacher trainer in Malta and holds the Cambridge DELTA. She has worked in diverse contexts, including a coordinator in Peru and an academic manager in Malta. She focuses on teacher wellbeing and observation practices that give teachers a stronger voice in their professional development.

WORKSHOP 5: CREATIVE TEACHING; CREATIVE THINKING? ENHANCING ENGLISH TEACHING THROUGH CREATIVE THINKING

Creative thinking is often considered one of the main skills needed by learners and workers in the 21st century. ELT professionals recognize the significance of this skill; however, a lack of clarity on how to implement this is frequently reported in research. The aim of this workshop is to enhance participants' understanding of what creative thinking entails while providing hands-on opportunities for enhancing typical English lesson stages using creative thinking frameworks. Specific focus will be placed on generating ideas, experimentation, and assessing the quality of ideas.

Non-standard grammar is a loose but very useful term for those forms and usages that are considered technically incorrect, but which are so commonplace that we perhaps need to consider them as an acceptable alternative, or not. This session explores a few such examples and considers how describing a form or usage as non-standard can be a tidy and concise way of explaining something that otherwise might be messy, vague and incomplete. It is a notion that learners tend to be happy to embrace.

WORKSHOP 10: EMPOWERING TEACHERS: A SKILLS-BASED RESILIENCE WORKSHOP

Teaching is a demanding profession that requires immense dedication, emotional resilience, and adaptability to manage diverse student needs, administrative burdens and constant curriculum changes. Without the right strategies and skills, teachers can experience high levels of stress and career burnout. The aim of this practical, skills-based workshop is to help educators build their awareness of the skills and practices that will facilitate resilience in their teaching career. It will provide a number of tools teachers can apply both in their classrooms and personal lives.

TALK 1A: BRINGING THE WILD INTO THE CLASSROOM

Various studies on informal foreign language learning underline the need to consider how students consume and engage with English in their free time. Critical reflection on formal as well as informal learning processes and the re-evaluation of what learner-centeredness actually means in the 21st century are therefore part of the future literacy required of every aspiring teacher and novice teacher. This talk therefore focuses on professional challenges facing future language teachers on the basis of existing research findings and sketches out experiences and attitudes of current English students of Heidelberg University of Education towards informal language learning.



Darja Brotzmann is part of the academic staff at Heidelberg University of Education. Her previous positions at the University of Giessen and Goettingen have allowed her to deepen and broaden her perspectives on teacher education. Her main research interests are informal language learning and controversial issues in the EFLC..

TALK 1B: USING TEACHORAMAS TO MOBILISE PEDAGOGIES OF POSSIBILITY

The aim of this talk is to introduce teachoramas as a way of promoting student-teachers' identities and knowledges as powerful sources of professional learning. A teachorama is a miniature model or visual scene (physical or digital) that depicts a classroom/teaching moment, used as a prompt for student-teachers to reflect on their identity and how they construct knowledge. Framed in post-critical teacher education, the talk will describe a pedagogical experience in which teachoramas were used to capture student-teachers' reflections on their professional identities and knowledge construction. The experience enabled them to imagine pedagogies grounded in empathy, presence, possibility, affirmation, and care.



Dario Luis Banegas is Senior Lecturer in Language Education at Moray House School of Education and Sport, University of Edinburgh. He teaches a course on second language curriculum development. His main areas of interest are: language teacher education, action research, CLIL, and curriculum design.

TALK 2A: CARING FOR THE CARERS: TEACHER WELL-BEING MATTERS IN ELT

This talk foregrounds teacher well-being as a foundation for good practice, innovation, and sustainable professional growth in ELT. Drawing on practitioner experience and reflective inquiry, it explores how emotional labour, workload, and institutional cultures shape teacher motivation, professional identity, and classroom decision-making. The session shares practical, low-threshold strategies for fostering supportive environments, peer connection, and manageable innovation. Participants will leave with concrete ideas for embedding well-being into everyday pedagogy and professional learning, and for advocating for cultures of care at classroom, departmental, and institutional levels.



Maria Makra (BA in English Language & Literature, MEd in TESOL, PgCert in Professional and Higher Education) is Head of ELT at Metropolitan College, Greece, with over 35 years' teaching experience. She is an active conference presenter and her research interests focus on CPD, assessment, and inclusive, human-centred pedagogies.

TALK 2B: EMBODYING PROFESSIONAL COACHING AND NEUROSCIENCE IN PEDAGOGY

This talk will explore how professional coaching and neuroscientific principles can be implemented to enhance pedagogy. From creating inclusive practice to fostering student resilience, to transforming teacher communication patterns, we will look at the science of coaching and how to embody neuroscientific research. Both these aspects can cultivate a positive learning culture, improve teacher-student relationships as well as provide teachers with the necessary tools to address challenges, promote resilience, and ultimately shape a more dynamic and inclusive educational landscape.



Rachel Marie Paling is a qualified UK lawyer, educator, coach, and creator of Neurolanguage Coaching and the Neuroheart Education Foundation. She holds a BA (Hons) in Law and Spanish, an MA in Human Rights, an MA in Applied Neuroscience, and an MA in Neuroeducation and Neuropsychology. TALK 3A: CRITICAL PEDAGOGY AND AI: REVITALIZING THE HUMAN HEARTBEAT IN ELT

Speaker: Julia Aliverti & Vicky Chionopoulou

In the evolving landscape of AI, the role of ELT educators is often misrepresented as either technically proficient or at risk of obsolescence. This proposal challenges these views by applying Paulo Freire's insights from *Letters to Those Who Dare Teach*. Instead of diminishing the educator's role, AI underscores the need for critical pedagogy. By recognizing AI as an active participant in education,

teachers can position themselves as vital mediators fostering critical awareness. This session will explore how Freirean virtues, humility, courage, and “armed love”, can guide educators in navigating AI, ensuring that human connection remains central to language learning and social justice.

Recent views on motivation and how we could apply them in ELT will also be discussed.

TALK 4A: TRANSFORMING TEACHING PRACTICE THROUGH ACTION RESEARCH

Speaker: Simona Macenaite

In order to tackle issues with learner engagement during speaking activities, a teacher engaged in a month-long action research project accompanied by two scholars. Four action interventions took place, followed by extensive reflection. As a result, the teacher has gained a set of new strategies to apply in her lessons, and, most importantly, has come to face and challenge deeply ingrained beliefs about teaching. Drawing on the data collected and the reflection diaries by the teacher, this talk outlines the learning process that the teacher went through and the long-lasting effects it had on her practice.



Simona Macenaite is a DELTA-certified English teacher, with a background in General Linguistics (Vilnius University), and Language Education (University of Edinburgh). Since 2020, she has been engaged in classroom-based research. Simona has presented her research at various conferences and published on her experiences as both a teacher-researcher and a teacher-research mentor.

TALK 4B: MORE THAN WORDS: STRATEGIC TRANSLANGUAGING FOR THE GLOBAL BUSINESS LEADERS OF TOMORROW

Speaker: Maria Kitsiou / BESIG Strand

This talk examines translanguaging as a pedagogical strategy for teenagers learning Business English alongside other languages. Integrating IES frameworks and European plurilingual models, it posits

that languages function as a shared cognitive resource rather than isolated compartments. For these students, “intercomprehension” leverages linguistic similarities between their L1 and another L2 to decode complex English professional terms. This approach facilitates engagement with sophisticated texts while validating multilingual identities. By replacing “English-only” immersion with strategic linguistic deployment, educators foster cognitive growth and better prepare students for the nuanced communication demands of the global business environment.



Maria Kitsiou is a Naples-based EFL/ESL teacher with 15 years' experience. Holding a DELTA and an MA in Gender Studies, she specializes in Business English and Cambridge exams. An IATEFL and BESIG member, she uses innovative, global methods to foster a passion for language and communication, transforming the classroom into a dynamic hub.

TALK 5A: TEACHING GRAMMAR: THE ROLE OF CONTEXT IN TEACHER DECISION MAKING

Speaker: Antonella Valeo

Despite shifting priorities and perspectives in language teaching and learning, teaching grammar remains an important feature of the adult language classroom and a challenge for many teachers. Yet, little is known about how teachers make decisions about teaching grammar. This study examined how ESL teachers working in a range of classroom contexts made pedagogical decisions, responding to the demands and affordances of their personal and professional contexts. The study highlights the highly individualized and idiosyncratic nature of teachers' pedagogical decisions and the potential for a more personalized and self-directed approach to teacher education and development throughout the career cycle.



Antonella Valeo is Associate Professor at York University where she teaches TESOL and graduate courses in applied linguistics. Her research examines language teacher education, form-focussed instruction and the role of feedback in the language classroom.

TALK 5B: COMICS IN THE CLASSROOM: REDUCING ANXIETY AND INDUCING CREATIVE WRITING

This session explores the use of comics as a tool for developing writing skills in English language teaching. Through visual storytelling, learners create short, theme-based narratives using comic panels, dialogue, and a sequential structure. This approach fosters creativity while reducing the anxiety often associated with writing tasks and allows students to express their ideas in meaningful ways. Drawing on classroom practice, the presentation demonstrates practical strategies for integrating comics into writing activities. It examines how comics can support the development of writing skills in ELT classrooms, while highlighting the potential of visual storytelling to enhance learner motivation and promote overall well-being.



Amira Derbel works at Malta University Language School and is a frequent presenter at international ELT conferences across Europe, Asia, and the MENA region. Her research explores comics, art, and discourse in English Language Teaching. She authored a number of articles and a book titled *Iranian Women in the Memoir*.

USING METAPHOR FOR TEACHING AND LEARNING

In their groundbreaking *Metaphors We Live By*, philosopher Mark Johnson and linguist George Lakoff call metaphor “unavoidable, ubiquitous, and mostly unconscious,” claiming that we “live our lives on the basis of inferences we derive via metaphor.” The presenter will share insights from years of musical study and performance and show how examining and understanding this experience has carried knowledge over to her linguistic and teaching career. A music student, after all, like a language student, must listen, repeat, practice patterns and drills, learn theory, rehearse alone and with others, and perform with meaning and passion in order to communicate. Audience members will finish by identifying a metaphor through which to better understand their own career.



Dorothy Zemach taught ESL and other languages for over 20 years, in Asia, Africa, and the US. With an MA in TESL from SIT in Vermont, USA, she now concentrates on writing, editing, and publishing ELT materials and conducting teacher training workshops. Her areas of specialty include teaching writing, teaching reading, academic English, testing, and humor.

TALK 6A: FROM SILENCE TO PARTICIPATION: PRACTICAL STRATEGIES FOR THE INTENTIONALLY INVITING CLASSROOM

Why do students stay silent even when they are capable of responding? This session explores the connection between learner well-being and English language acquisition. Drawing on Krashen's Affective Filter Hypothesis and Purkey's Invitational Theory, it shows how moving from being "accidentally nice" to "intentionally inviting" can reduce anxiety and support learning. Through the lens of the 5 P's (people, places, policies, programs, and processes), teachers will examine how to lower learners' affective filters and create classrooms where students feel safer, more confident, and more willing to participate.



Ann Gaillard holds a Doctor of Education and has twenty-five years' experience in ELT across Asia and the Middle East. She is an International Baccalaureate educator and teacher trainer specialising in multilingual pedagogy and learner well-being. Bringing together research and classroom practice, she supports teachers in creating inclusive, confidence-building learning environments in which diverse learners can participate and thrive.

While optimized scripts are readily available, learners often lack the confidence to deliver them authentically. To bridge this gap, this session shares a framework enabling professionals to move beyond mere recitation and foster linguistic agency. We will explore how semantics and positive framing empower applicants to transform perceived weaknesses into assets. Participants will gain practical guiding techniques for helping individuals make more intentional, confident and human-centric communication choices that project tangible value.



Alex Lojo is a Spain-based Business English specialist and language school manager with fourteen years' cross-disciplinary experience in linguistic application. He holds a BEd in TEFL and a Master's in Talent Management, combining pedagogical theory with academic leadership to develop communication strategies that unlock human potential and enhance professional expertise.

TALK 8A: FLUENT OUTPUT, FRAGILE LEARNING: WHAT GENAI CHANGES IN ELT

Speaker: Christopher Fenech

This talk explores what happens when learners can produce fluent English with generative AI before they can do so independently and why this matters for ELT professionals. Focusing on the gap between apparent fluency and underlying competence, it examines three classroom concerns: agency, authorship, and false mastery. Drawing on research and classroom-informed examples, this session will show how AI-generated language can support learning while also masking weak comprehension and reducing productive struggle. Attendees will leave with practical guidance and strategies for building verification, reflection, and transparent authorship into AI-mediated language tasks without displacing genuine learner development.



Christopher Fenech is a CELTA-qualified English teacher and lecturer in Malta. His work focuses on language education, technology, and society, particularly the impact of AI on learning. He holds an MA in Contemporary Western Philosophy and teaches Business English at MQF Level 5 within Malta's higher education sector.

TALK 8B: TOOLS FOR LASTING IMPACT: WHEN CPD STICKS BEYOND THE SCREEN

This session explores how continuing professional development can achieve lasting impact beyond the event or platform. Drawing on experience mentoring teachers in India and Brazil, it examines how sustainable CPD depends on structured progression from engagement to implementation, adaptation, and sharing. Two practical tools are introduced to support this process, enabling teachers to track, reflect on, and sustain pedagogical change over time. While digital tools may enhance access and continuity, the session highlights how low-tech and no-tech practices such as reflection, repetition, and peer accountability ensure durability. Sustainability is reframed as the extent to which teachers continue to transfer learning into everyday practice.



Patricia Ibiapina is an English language teacher and teacher educator based in Brazil. She has mentored teachers in India and Brazil, supporting sustainable professional development. Her work focuses on teacher agency, reflective practice, and the pedagogically sound use of technology to enhance continuing professional development and long-term impact.

TALK 9A: CREATING VALUE IN A MULTICULTURAL ELT CLASSROOM

Teaching in a multicultural environment requires more than subject knowledge. Learners bring diverse backgrounds, habits, and expectations that can both enrich and challenge the classroom. This talk explores how such diversity can affect communication, participation, and atmosphere, and how teachers can respond effectively. Drawing on classroom experience, it highlights common barriers to inclusion and the role of teacher self-awareness. Participants will reflect on their own practice and consider how potential obstacles can become opportunities for connection. The session offers practical, adaptable strategies to build rapport, encourage interaction, and support learners from different cultural backgrounds, fostering a more engaging and inclusive learning environment.



Danilo Carciolo is an Italian ESL teacher based in Malta, with teaching experience in New York and Belgium. He holds a Master's degree in Specialised Translation and Interpreting and has a background in theatre, having studied acting and worked as a performer. His interests include multilingual education, classroom dynamics, and intercultural communication.

TALK 9B: TRANSITIONING FROM ENGLISH LANGUAGE TEACHER TO TEACHER EDUCATOR IN MALTA

This talk shares findings from research conducted in Malta on the experiences of educators who moved from teaching English to becoming teacher educators. Based on interviews, the study explores how participants adapted to new roles that involved guiding, mentoring, and supporting other teachers. It looks at how they managed changes in professional identity, responsibility, and confidence. The findings show the importance of classroom experience, the challenges of being seen as an expert by peers, and the need to build skills in mentoring, facilitation, and reflective practice. The talk will consider how future teacher educators can be better prepared and supported.



Savannah Davis is an educator, international conference speaker, and published writer with a passion for psycholinguistics and second language acquisition. She is interested in research on the relationship between language and cognition as well as the effective use of technology in language teaching and learning.

TALK 10A: TOO TIRED TO LEARN: TEACHER BURNOUT AND WELL-BEING IN ELT

Professional development is central to teacher growth and institutional quality in ELT, yet experienced teachers' reduced participation is often interpreted as resistance or lack of motivation. This talk offers a more nuanced perspective by examining how burnout, emotional exhaustion, workload pressure, and reduced professional agency may shape teachers' capacity to engage with PD. Drawing on an exploratory study with experienced ELT teachers, it investigates what makes professional development feel meaningful, supportive, or burdensome. The session highlights the need for PD cultures that recognise teacher well-being as essential to sustainable professional growth.



Aysegul Salli is an Assistant Professor in the Foreign Languages Education Department and coordinator of the Professional Development Unit at the School of Foreign Languages, Eastern Mediterranean University. She also serves as the joint coordinator of TESOL Türkiye METASIG. Her work focuses on professional development, assessment, mediation, and teacher identity.

TALK 10B: STAY SANE IN THE PRESENCE OF WOKE GEN ZS WHO ARE ASLEEP

Born into a hyperconnected, fast-moving digital world, Gen Zs arrive with distinct cognitive molds that traditional language teaching methodologies are unequipped to tackle. This talk examines what Gen Zs really need in the classroom, how their brains actually learn, and how to evoke emotions for memorable lessons. Participants will be equipped with techniques grounded in neuroscience, that

embody competition and kinaesthesia and that trigger emotions for long-term retention. They will also leave with a new perspective and ways to motivate a disengaged Gen Z, so that teachers no longer have to compete with anti-social and artificially intelligent media.



Sharon Joseph combines over 10 years of language teaching experience with her Medical Science background to bring innovative evidence-based methodologies to every class. She is obsessed with developing learner-centred techniques that empower educators to connect deeply with their students, leave a lasting impact, and foster meaningful real-world communication.

WORKSHOP 16: BEYOND CORRECTNESS: PRACTICAL STRATEGIES FOR DEVELOPING PRAGMATIC COMPETENCE

Central to effective communication is pragmatic competence: the ability to structure discourse, perform communicative functions, and navigate turn-taking in conversation. Despite its vital importance to L2 ability, it has systematically been neglected in formal education. Bridging this gap, this workshop explores pragmatic descriptors within the CEFR, providing practical strategies and engaging activities to incorporate pragmatic features into classroom teaching. Participants will walk away with a better understanding of how to foster pragmatic competence in their classrooms.



Andrea Conti teaches at the Centre for Academic Literacies and English Communication Skills of the University of Malta. With six years of experience in ELT, his research interests revolve around the intersection of Corpus Linguistics and Pragmatics, focusing on practical applications of phraseology in the classroom.

WORKSHOP 17: THRIVING, NOT JUST SURVIVING: ELT IN 2026

If you have ever felt depleted and unable to cope with daily demands or have developed a negative attitude towards your job, students or colleagues, you have probably suffered from burnout. In Europe, around half of teachers report high stress levels, with many being concerned about their mental wellbeing. This workshop explores teacher burnout in contemporary ELT, combining research with practical classroom insights. Rather than focusing solely on theory, it offers adaptable strategies that can be applied immediately to support both teacher and student wellbeing. By reframing wellbeing as an integral part of professional development, the session encourages teachers to adopt small, sustainable changes that help maintain motivation, improve classroom dynamics and create more balanced teaching practices.



Marielou Mifsud has been a passionate EFL teacher for 17 years and received the Inspiring ELT Professional Award in 2017 in recognition of her outstanding contributions to education. Jelena Spasic is an English language teacher with over 25 years of experience. Learning, practice and the emotions associated with becoming a teacher are often challenging and varied. This talk will focus on the emotions experienced by the participants in this study as they journeyed through their TESOL master's and microteaching and how these emotions seemed to take on an almost cyclical nature. It will also reflect on the importance of being aware of the emotional transitions that student-teachers and teachers can experience in their practice.



Vanessa McDonagh is a lecturer in EAP and co-programme lead of the MSc TESOL at the University of Glasgow. She holds a doctorate from Queen's University Belfast and is interested in identity, teacher beliefs, wellbeing and motivation for teachers and students.

It emphasizes teacher agency, viewing educators as facilitators of inquiry and reflection. WORKSHOP 25: PRONUNCIATION HUB: CLASSROOM APPLICATION OF HIGH VARIABILITY PHONETIC TRAINING

Speaker: Anastazija Kirkova-Naskova

High Variability Phonetic Training (HVPT) is a pronunciation technique that employs numerous audio stimuli produced by multiple talkers (different age, gender, origin) in varied phonetic contexts. HVPT activities enhance learners' perceptual discrimination skills, which further facilitate and promote more intelligible L2 speech. This workshop aims to present HVPT activities that vary in format and degree of difficulty, that are easily adjustable for practising different speech phenomena, and for which a minimum materials preparation time is needed. They are suitable as warm-ups, lead-ins, or for whole-class focus practice. The workshop participants will receive a sample handout with ready-made exercises.



Anastazija Kirkova-Naskova is a Professor in English phonology and morphology at Ss. Cyril and Methodius University in Skopje. Her research focuses on pronunciation instruction. She co-edited *English pronunciation instruction: Research-based insights* (John Benjamins, 2021), and *Achievements in second language pronunciation: Good practices for teaching and learning* (Cambridge University Press, forthcoming).

Teacher burnout has become a growing challenge that impacts well-being, teaching quality, and student outcomes. This interactive workshop reframes burnout as a response to prolonged stress rather than personal failure. Through engaging activities such as Burnout Bingo (based on Maslach Teacher Burnout Test), control-mapping, and guided reflection, participants explore key dimensions of burnout and identify practical ways to restore balance. The session focuses on small, sustainable strategies that increase teachers' sense of control, reduce emotional exhaustion, and rebuild professional confidence. Participants will leave with ready-to-use classroom ideas, simple stress-management techniques, and a renewed sense of purpose, helping them reconnect with the reasons they chose teaching. Being in a group with the same worries, stress, anxieties, and hopes shows us that we are not alone and that we can do it!



Lejla Saric obtained the BACS English/European History, Southampton University and wrote for *Cosmopolitan*. In her 29 years of experience she has contributed to various conferences and devised workshops for teachers and students. Dijana Markovic-Hajdarhodzic, who has been a teacher for 25 years, holds a Master's degree in teaching English to speakers of other languages. Through practical classroom tasks, participants analyse how AI can both support and hinder development, focusing on confidence and perseverance. The session offers concrete strategies to ensure AI use leads to retention, transfer, and independent language use rather than an illusion of understanding.
